## FROM THE DIRECTOR

There's nothing like an oversimplified, yet still-somehow-incomprehensible spy story to satisfy our hunger for thrills. When Alfred Hitchcock (very loosely) adapted John Buchan's spy novel for his 1935 film, he defined so many of the aspects of the escapist thrillers we know today: the fugitive hero, the mysterious female spy, egregious action sequences, and the ridiculous MacGuffin. Hitchcock loved the MacGuffin technique. Once you know about MacGuffins, it's impossible not to spot them in nearly every thriller. This goofily named narrative device refers to something that is necessary to the plot and the character's motivation – but utterly irrelevant on its own. Think of the briefcase in Pulp Fiction, Rosebud in Citizen Kane, that stupid necklace in The Titanic. A MacGuffin could be anything, as long as it jumpstarts the plot and causes the characters to go through hell to get it. It is literally and figuratively the holy grail.

So why adapt this '30s spy film into a stage play where 4 actors play over 90 characters? Because it's fun. That's it, really. It's delightful to see a chase scene on a moving train reimagined for the stage with just a few props and lighting effects. Recreating scenes that originated on film on a mostly bare stage is a testament to the power of live theatre. The effect is impressive, while also quite hilarious. And it works because you're already familiar with the tropes. You've seen how many films where the hero jumps from train car to train car to escape his pursuers? We're going to rely heavily on the part of your brain dedicated to storing pop culture references.

This is escapist entertainment. Don't misunderstand: it's devilishly smart. But at its heart, The 39 Steps is here to whisk you away. To make you laugh, groan, and cheer. So, I invite you to lean into that. Escape for a couple of hours. Irreverence, silliness, and levity are essential to a better world. They crack us open, so that kindness, hope, and love can enter.

In the words of our hero, Richard Hannay (rather, one of Hitchcock's team of writers in 1935):

"Let's all just set ourselves resolutely to make this world a happier place! A decent world! A good world! A world where no nation plots against nation! Where no neighbour plots against neighbour, where there's no persecution or hunting down, where everybody gets a square deal and a sporting chance and where people try to help and not to hinder! A world where suspicion and cruelty and fear have been forever banished! That's the sort of world I want! Is that the sort of world you want?"

Yes, it is, Mr. Hannay! Enjoy the play.

Besides his version of Lew Wallace's Ben Hur, Patrick Barlow's Olivier-nominated adaptation of A Christmas Carol has played off-Broadway and London's West End while his 4-person adaptation of The 39 Steps has played in over forty countries worldwide, winning Olivier, Helpmann, Moliere and Tony Awards and making Patrick the most performed playwright in America for 2012/13. Most recently, his rewriting of John Milton's Comus has played to critical acclaim at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre.

Patrick is also celebrated in the UK for his two-man theatre company National Theatre of Brent, whose comedy epics include Wagner's Ring Cycle, The Charles and Diana Story, The Messiah, The Wonder of Sex, The Arts and How They Was Done, The Black Hole of Calcutta, The Life and Times of the Dalai Lama and Zulu! They have won two Sony Gold Awards, a Premier Ondas Award for Best European Comedy and the New York Festival Gold Award for Best Comedy.

Other screenwriting includes Van Gogh (Prix Futura Berlin Film Festival), Revolution!! (Best Comedy Jerusalem Film Festival) and the BAFTA-winning The Young Visiters. Publications include Shakespeare: The Truth! and The Complete History of the Whole World. Patrick has also appeared in Absolutely Fabulous, Shakespeare in Love, Notting Hill, Nanny McPhee and Bridget Jones's Diary. He is currently writing theatre versions of The Hound of the Baskervilles and Dracula.

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
